Munising Memorial Hospital

PURPOSE OF ASSESSMENT

Over the years, Munising Memorial Hospital (MMH) has used numerous methods to assess the health needs of Alger County residents and has adjusted its services to meet those identified needs. Federal laws governing nonprofit hospitals like MMH require the organizations to coordinate a community-wide health needs assessment every three years and report the outcome of those evaluations as part of their corporate tax filing with the Internal Revenue Service.

Through a joint effort between the Alger County Chamber of Commerce/Greater Munising Bay Partnership for Commerce Development (GMBPCD) and MMH, a community health care needs assessment was conducted by evaluating health data, meeting with health care leaders, and administering an online survey which was open to the public and advertised for two months. This has given both entities the opportunity to identify and address the healthcare needs in the area.

EXISTING HEALTH CARE FACILITIES AND OTHER RESOURCES

Munising Memorial Hospital

Munising Memorial Hospital (MMH) was first established in 1910 when the original hospital was built on Maple Street in Munising. It was funded by Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Co. as one of many major gifts made by the company throughout the region by the company during that era. In 1947, the hospital shifted and became a nonprofit organization when it obtained its 501(c)3 status from the Internal Revenue Service. From that point forward, it was and has continued to be a community hospital.

The structure along Maple Street was replaced in 1961 when another facility opened along Sand Point Road. In 2008, that clinic was torn down and replaced by a new state of the art hospital complex. The current principal facilities are located at 1500 Sand Point RD in Munising and consist of a hospital building comprised of the Bay Care Medical Center, Urgent Care, and a medical office building that are all adjacent to each other.

MMH is an 11-bed critical access hospital that provides outpatient diagnostic services, swing beds, and Level 4 Emergency Services, with an average of one inpatient per day. Urgent Care walk-in services were established in September 2015 to provide a lower cost alternative to the ER during afterhours and weekends.

The mission of MMH is to be the provider of choice for primary medical and hospital care for Alger County residents. MMH employees and practitioners provide the highest level of quality care within our resources and abilities with unsurpassed personal and professional integrity.

MMH services are limited to primary care medical services. Many secondary (specialty) and tertiary care treatments are provided either in Marquette or outside of the Upper Peninsula.

MMH has become the primary employer of physicians and mid-level providers in Alger County, providing services to the community through the Bay Care Clinic.

Munising Memorial Organizational Information

The hospital is owned by a nonprofit corporation organized under the laws of Michigan, which is exempt from federal income taxation as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

The corporation is licensed to operate the hospital by the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH). Various hospital functions are licensed by other governmental authorities. The U.S. Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) contracts with MDCH to provide surveys to address quality and operational matters. Three of the hospital functions are currently accredited:

- American College of Radiology Accreditation for Mammography service.
- Community Hospital Laboratory Accreditation (COLA) of the laboratory.
- Bay Care American Association for Accreditation of Ambulatory Surgery Facilities

Munising Memorial Hospital is a member of the Michigan Health and Hospital Association.

Munising Memorial Hospital Quality Metrics

MMH has made an organization-wide commitment to improving patient safety and the overall quality of patient care. The hospital has routinely earned Governor's Awards for Improving Patient Safety and Quality of Care in the Critical Access Hospital Setting. As a Critical Access Hospital (CAH), the hospital receives payments from BCBSM in part based upon pay for performance quality measures. Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services measures are collected and reported, however, the majority have insufficient volume to be publicly reported. In 2019, MMH was listed as a Top 20 Critical Access Hospital Best Practice in Patient Satisfaction recipients by the National Rural Health Association.

Munising Memorial Hospital Facilities and Services

The corporation owns and operates the hospital, which, as a CAH, is licensed for 11 acute care beds and five dual licensed swing beds to provide rehabilitation services. All acute care beds are situated in six rooms facing Munising Bay of Lake Superior. All inpatient care and most outpatient services are delivered under one roof in the hospital facility. An independent physician office and space for visiting specialists are attached to the hospital facility.

The scope of services provided by MMH is generally similar to that provided by other CAHs. The hospital facility contains the following areas:

- Completely digitized, the Radiology Department now includes a digital X-ray room, CT,
 Fluoroscopy, 4D Ultrasound, Dexascan and digital mammography.
- **Laboratory** services were designed to accommodate two private drawing rooms and several upgrades to equipment, computer systems and space.

- The **Outpatient Rehabilitation** department allows for easier access for patients including a complete gym, four treatment rooms and a shower for gym participants.
- The **Emergency Department** includes three private exam rooms and a three-bay trauma room. The two-bay ambulance garage includes a decontamination area.
- Six **inpatient rooms** display a hotel-like, comfortable atmosphere. The rooms are equipped with flat panel televisions and face the lake for a beautiful view.
- Two **conference rooms** can be used for support groups, educational programs and administrative meetings.
- **Bay Care Medical Center** has eighteen exam rooms and one procedure room and is open Monday-Friday 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. There's also a small clinic in Grand Marais, along with school-based clinics.
- Munising Memorial offers a swing bed program to patients over the age of 65 needing to recover/ rehabilitate after an acute hospital stay. MMH went from having 2 Swing Bed Licenses in late October 2020 to now having 5 Swing Bed Licenses.
- Munising Memorial partnered with **Great Lakes Recovery** in the summer of 2021 to provide services at the hospital for those individuals seeking substance abuse treatment.

Inpatient beds are used for observation, hospitalization, and short-term rehabilitation. The hospital's emergency department is classified as a Level IV trauma center by the American College of Surgeons. A Level IV trauma center provides initial evaluation, stabilization, diagnostic capabilities, and transfer to a higher level of care. MMH maintains a transfer agreement with UP Health System-Marquette, which operates a Level II trauma center, to which nearly all transfers are directed.

The county's emergency medical service (EMS) is operated by the Alger County Sheriff's Department. In many situations, serious trauma cases, especially those resulting from incidents occurring west of the hospital facility, will be transported directly to UP Health System-Marquette.

The hospital also offers diabetes education and programming and telemedicine services to those patients who require, and can benefit from, healthcare services outside of the area.

Munising Memorial Medical Staff

Regarding medical staffing, MMH currently has:

- Chief Medical Doctor who is an MD
- Emergency Department Director, a DO with Board Certification in Emergency Medicine
- Chief of Staff, a DO that provides Family Practice Services
- An MD hospitalist that will soon offer Family Practice Services in the spring or summer of 2023
- One PA in Hospitalist, Family Practice and Peds
- One PA coming in February who will provide women's health services and family practice
- One NP who is coming in early January who will provide Mental Health Services
- Seven NP/PA's that provide Urgent Care Services/ Emergency Room Service

Other Alger County Health Services and Facilities

Besides MMH, there are several Alger County health care facilities/services in Munising, including:

- Two dental offices
- Four mental health services
- Two primary care clinics and walk-ins
- One tribal health center
- The health department servicing Alger County
- One chiropractic office
- One optometrist office

There are two small primary care clinics with limited hours located in Grand Marais and Trenary. The facility in Trenary is operated by UP Health System, offering the following services:

- Office Exams
- Urgent Care Visits
- Allergy Injections
- Laboratory Services
- Routine Immunization Program
- Electrocardiograms
- Sports Physicals
- Minor Outpatient Surgery
- Referrals to Home Health, Specialists, or Mental Health Services

Long-term facilities in Alger County include:

- One nursing home
- Six adult foster care apartments in one facility
- One adult day care center
- One assisted living facility

In addition, there is one home health care and hospice organization in Munising, diabetes educational programming and the Alger County Commission on Aging.

Recent Achievements

MMH uses data and information obtained through Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNA) to help plan for future services to better serve the community. Since the 2019 CHNA, MMH has implemented the following to address concerns:

- MMH went from having 2 Swing Bed Licenses in late October 2020 to now having 5 Swing Bed Licenses.
- Bay Care hired an RN Case Manager to help individuals with chronic illness navigate through healthcare systems and manage their disease.
- Munising Memorial partnered with Great Lakes Recovery to provide substance abuse services at the hospital. MMH intends to implement educational programming regarding substance abuse in conjunction with Great Lakes Recovery, whether that be virtual, inperson or both.
- Held discussions with Pathways Mental Health services to come up with solutions regarding mental health treatment needs in Alger County.
- UPHP will be partnering with MMH to embed mental health services with family practice medicine.
- MMH participates in federal 340B, thus reducing costs of prescriptions for patients.
- MMH works with Putvin Drug Store, Alger County's local pharmacy, to provide educational materials that make customers aware of options available to reduce the cost of their prescriptions.
- MMH provides the community with educational programs on how to find low-cost insurance and how to sign up for insurance.
- MMH has continued purchasing bus tickets from local transportation service ALTRAN and has collaborated with ALTRAN to transport area residents to MMH programming.

GREATER MUNISING BAY PARTNERSHIP FOR COMMERCE DEVELOPMENT/ ALGER COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The Greater Munising Bay Partnership for Commerce Development (GMBPCD) /Alger County Chamber of Commerce was chosen to assist in facilitating the community health needs assessment due to the office's relationship with the Alger County community, organizations, businesses, and leaders. GMBPCD staff, Dr. Katherine A Reynolds, chief executive officer, Pat Sanderson, officer manager, and Jaymie Depew, communications and special project assistant, held meetings with local health care leaders, created and promoted an online survey to help gather data from Alger County residents, and prepared the overall report.

Dr. Reynolds has a Ph.D. from Southern Illinois University and is well versed in research, writing, and community relations. She also has previous work experience in rural health services and higher education. Pat Sanderson brings over 35 years of customer service experience in both office and retail management. She provides administrative management support and acts as a liaison to the chamber members and DDA district businesses. Pat is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the office and organizations, as well as assisting with or coordinating any special events or projects. Jaymie Depew has 7 years of experience in research and professional writing, including covering topics for MMH and UPHS-Marquette. Along with our office, she also works for the Munising Visitors Bureau.

The GMBPCD promotes tourism and economic development in Alger County, which contributes to the overall wellbeing of the municipalities, townships, and villages in Alger County. The office collaborates with and supports the area and its businesses by formulating sound economic programs and policies that attract, maintain, and provide incentives to business and property owners. They also help mobilize the area's resources, creating consistent marketing strategies to increase tourism by promoting natural resources, attractions, and events throughout the area. The GMBPCD works to enhance and open more lines of communication between public and private businesses, associations, agencies, and organizations.

The Greater Munising Bay Partnership for Commerce Development/Alger County Chamber of Commerce is located at 129 E. Munising Ave., Munising. The office is also known as the Fuzzy Boyak Welcome Center and is ideally located in the center of town along the main state highway and adjacent to Munising's waterfront and Binsfeld Bayshore Park.

COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION & MARKET AREA

Munising Memorial Hospital is in the city of Munising, Michigan in Alger County near the Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore (PRNL) and Hiawatha National Forest. According to the United States Census Bureau's 2020 statistics, the population of Alger County is 9,098. MMH defines its market area as all residents of Alger County. The area economy is supported by small businesses, industries and corporations, and tourism.

Unlike many other small rural towns across the Midwest, Alger County is fortunate to have a diversified economy. Neenah Paper in Munising is one of the most successful paper and packaging manufacturing businesses in the Midwest targeting specialized products. Other large employers in the area are Timber Products and Alger Max Correctional Facility.

Approximately 800,000 – 1.3 million visitors annually travel from all over the world to Alger County to see the PRNL. The large influx of visitors over the past decade has led to a boom in small business growth throughout the county, making tourism the largest economic driver in the area.

COMMUNITY DESCRIPTION & MARKET AREA

The hospital is in the City of Munising, MI (Alger County). The population (according to United States Census Bureau 2020 statistics) of Alger County is 8,842. The estimated population for 2021 is 8,821. The Hospital defines its market area as the County. The market area is rural in nature. The area's economy is supported by small businesses, industries, and tourism.

There were two meetings where topics covered were: the healthcare needs of the county, the healthcare needs assessment process and their input on questions for the survey participants.

Kathy explained that not-for-profit hospitals are required by federal laws to conduct a local community health needs assessment, following specific guidelines, every three years. She said the plan is to hold two of these meetings with stakeholders in the county that deal with different aspects of health care, one public meeting to get feedback from the community (probably in September) and conduct a survey. During the 2019 MMH HNA, the greatest number of survey respondents were in the 55- to 65-year-old bracket, and more than half earned \$45,000 or more. We are hoping to get a wider range of respondents this year.

The following were viewed as Strengths by those attending today's meeting:

- 1) The pandemic was handled well across the county
- 2) People living in the area take care of each other there is a cohesiveness in the community
- 3) There is good access to healthcare in Alger County ER, radiology, lab work, extended hours for urgent care, and good providers
- 4) Also, good access with 3 local dentist offices, an eye doctor, and good communication and collaboration between the offices and providers
- 5) Good partnerships between different entities to get answers and share information
- 6) Able to get referrals from other communities; locally we generally have short wait times and good availability for appointments
- 7) Local access to some specialists Great Lakes Recovery, dermatology, ENT
- 8) Good access and short wait times for radiology, labs and family doctors; good COVID response

The following were viewed as Weaknesses by those attending today's meeting:

- 1) Emergency preparedness brought to the forefront by COVID
- 2) Lack of qualified local staffing medical and support staff
- 3) Specialty services for children not readily available; must travel to Marquette or farther
- 4) Lack of some mental health and addiction services

- 5) Some local dentists could be retiring soon
- 6) Lack of specialists across the UP, including psychiatric care, causing long travels for care
- 7) Lack of transportation for appointments or treatments
- 8) Need more mental health services for youths and adults
- 9) Lack of awareness of services that are available; need to make people more aware of what's available
- 10) Lack of specialty care across the UP
- 11) Lack of housing for employees and increased travel costs
- 12) Lack of beds available across the region
- 13) Lack of medical transport for specialty services
- 14) Lack of childcare for employees or someone taking a child or family member for an appointment or treatment
- 15) Emergency preparedness needed for the unknown

Retention of staff:

- 1) If someone stays 5+ years, they will stay longer newer hires tend to switch jobs frequently
- 2) Lack of LPNs and RNs traveling medical positions and a large pay increase in Marquette have impacted local hiring
- 3) People are not leaving the medical profession, but not as many are going into the medical profession
- 4) Lower paying positions are tough to fill when employment is available with lower qualifications for the same or higher wages at other businesses

In-person community meeting and survey – how to get more people involved:

- 1) Possibly team up with other entities to get a better turnout
- 2) AC Commission on Aging could deliver paper copies of survey to clients
- 3) Post flyers and/or have paper copies of the survey at Lakeshore Manor, Jericho House, MMH, Superior Walk-in, MediLodge, Putvin Drug Store, Bob's IGA, Family Fare

People need to be made aware of the variety of services available through LMAS.

Hard copies of posters and survey cards (with QR code and link to website) will be made available at various places around town.







Leading Cause of Deaths for Ten Leading Causes by Age Alger County, Michigan 2020







Q2 Where do you live in Alger County?





Q3 What is your gender?







Q5 What is your race?




Q6 Are you currently employed?









Q13 How would you rate your overall mental health?







Q18 What keeps you and family members from seeking medical treatment?







Q19 How many times did you use any healthcare services in Alger County last year?





Q20 How often have you traveled outside of Alger County for mental health services in the last five years?



Q21 How often have you traveled outside of Alger County to receive other healthcare services in the last five years?



Q22 How often have you traveled outside of Alger County to receive substance abuse services in the last five years?





Q24 If you or someone in your family were ill and required medical care, where would you go?







Q26 On a scale of 1-5, 1 being the lowest, how concerned are you about COVID-19 in your community?





Q27 What health screenings or education/information services are needed in Alger County? (Check all that apply)









Q29 Have you been to the dentist in the last two years?





Q31 Where do you and your family get most of your information on healthcare services? (Check all that apply)



ASSESSMENT SURVEY CONCLUSIONS

This year's Alger County Health Needs Assessment utilized an online survey to obtain more data pertaining to area residents' healthcare needs and opinions. Based on the online survey of 296 Alger County participants, some of the highlights of the survey are listed below.

The highest percentage of survey participants indicated that they:

- Are residents of the City of Munising, Munising Township and Au Train Township
- Are Female
- Are ages 56+
- Are white
- Work full-time or are retired
- Have 1-2 people in their household
- Have an average household income is \$46,000+
- Either have some college or a college degree
- Have insurance
- Felt their insurance was adequate
- Would rate their overall physical health at least good
- Would rate their overall mental health at least good
- Felt the major strengths in healthcare services/resources in Alger County are physical therapy, eye care, Munising Memorial Hospital, LMAS District Health Department and Superior Walk-In & Family Health
- Saw the major healthcare concerns in Alger County over the next five years were Drugs, alcohol or substance abuse, mental health/depression/suicide, cancer, insurance costs, lack of insurance, prescription costs, obesity, senior care, dental, lack of emotional support in schools/crisis intervention and access to services

Also noteworthy:

- 19% of the respondents had not been to the dentist or had an eye exam in the last two years
- o 76% of the respondents thought that Alger County healthcare providers needed to promote their services more often
